Flowers and Sick People.

Many argue that flowers should be kept away from the room of a sick person's lest they exhaust the air, etc. That is true with certain flowere, such as lilies and lilac, but a few roses, mignonette, or violets will prove to be most refreshing and reviving to weary eyes and depressed spirits—which is the real ministry of flowere flowers.

Nuts as an Article of Food.

Nuts are coming to be considered more and more as an article of staple diet. Scientific analysis has proved that most nuts contain more lood value to the pound than most other kinds of food. It is claimed that peanuts contain twice as much nourishment as beginteak rice or cheese and eight times as much as beefsteak, rice, or checse, and eight times as much as potato. Next come the chestnuts, which are so rich in starch as to be almost bread. They are used prin-In starch as to be almost bread. They are used prin-cipally for soups, sauces, entrees, and desserts. English walnuts, hickory nuts, and pecans are tich in fats, but contain little starch. The black walnut, which is stronger in flavor than the walnut or butternut, is used for cakes and salads. Filberts, hazelnuts, and beech nuts are all used for flavoring a variety of dishes.

Those Wasteful Chops.

Living in a community where meat had always been the most expensive item of the table, when that article of food was considerably advanced it became necessary to study, still more closely, economy in that ' hecessary to study, still more closely, economy in that line. Formerly in cooking mutton chops the ends were left on, and it was quite noticeable that they were usually discarded by the members of the family on ac-count of the excess of fat. One day when preparing chops for cooking, the thought came to cut off the ends and try to use them for a stew. This was done, and with the addition of metato onion rice and one or and try to use them for a stew. This was done, and with the addition of potato, onion, rice, and one or two small pieces of left-over meat, such a savory dish was served that the family was unanimous in its praise of the same. Now two meals are prepared from the same quantity of meat that used to be sufficient for only one meal. The stew may be varied by using celery, turnips, and other vegetables, as fancied, and if cooked slowly and properly seasoned, a nutritious and palatable dish will be the result, with no extra cost for meat. meat.

Things Worth Knowing.

Always place a knife which has been used in cutting onions immediately under the cold water tap prevent the odor from clinging to the blade.

Carrots, beans, onions, turnips, cabbage, and cauli-flower are improved in flavor by parboiling, draining the water off, and putting to cook in fresh water.

Too many eggs will toughen muffin or drop batter mixtures. For additional richness use melted butter or cream, and for lightness, especially with thick bat-ters, beat vigorously to force in as much air as possible.

If mustard is made with boiling water, with a little salt added, it will not dry and cake in the mustard pot.

Ivory knife handles which have become yellow from age and misuse may be whitehed by being rubbed gently with fine sandpaper and then polished with a clean piece of chamois skin.

The combination of rhubarb and prunes make a delicious pie. The prunes are just what the rhubarb needs to cover its acidity.
