Late Burnside Stock Report

Sheep.—1838 penned, ewes forming a large proportion of these. Best sorts were armer, but medium kinds were a trifle less than last week. Best wethers, 18s 6d to 19s 6d; extra, 23s 9d; medium, 15s to 17s 6d; inferior, 14s 3d to 14s 9d; best ewes, 16s to 17s 9d; extra, 19s 6d; medium, 12s to 15s 6d; inferior, 11s to 12s.

Cattle.—There was a big yarding of 233, a fair proportion of these being fair quality bullocks. Owing to the large yarding there was no advance on last week's prices. Best bullocks, £9 10s to £10s 15s; medium, £8 12s 6d to £9 7s 6d; light, £6 2s 6d to £6 12s 6d; cows and heifers, £4 15s to £6 5s. There was a fair yarding of dairy cows, which sold at prices ranging from £1 15s to £7 5s.

Lambs.—There was a small yarding of 1000, prices being about the same as last week. Best lambs, 16s to 17s; extra, 17s 6d; medium, 14s 6d to 15s 6d; light, 12s to 13s.

Pigs.—90 penned. There was a fair proportion of porkers. Prices were slightly brisker than those ruling last week. Suckers, 12s 6d to 14s 6d; slips, 15s to 19s 6d; stores, 20s to 25s; porkers, 31s to 39s; light baconers, 46s 6d to 49s; heavy do, 55s to 65s.

Messrs. Donald Reid and Co., Ltd., report: We held our weekly auction sale of grain and produce at our stores on Monday. There was a large gathering of buyers, to whom we submitted a lengthy catalogue of oats, wheat, potatoes, chaff, and straw. For nearly all these lines there was good competition, and the catalogue was cleared at prices in most cases, fully equal to or a shade above late quotations. Values ruled as under:—

Oats.—During the past week a considerable quantity has been coming forward, and as there is good demand for export all good to prime oats have met with ready sale on arrival. Prime heavy Gartons are in most request, but all bright, heavy lines are saleable at quotations. Medium and inferior lots are not so readily dealt with. Quotations: Prime milling 2s 4d to 2s 4½d, good to best feed 2s 3d to 2s 4d, inferior to medium 2s 1d to 2s 2d per bushel (sacks extra).

Wheat.—Prime milling lines are in good demand with local millers, who show more disposition to purchase velvet and red chaff than other kinds. Tuscan is fairly plentiful, and has not the same attention unless specially prime. Fowl wheat is offering more freely, but continues to have fair sale. Quotations: Choice milling lines 4s 7½d to 4s 8d, prime milling 4s 6½d to 4s 7d, medium 4s 6d, best whole fowl wheat 4s 5d to 4s 6d, medium do. 4s 3d to 4s 4d, broken and damaged 3s 6d to 4s 1d per bushel (sack's extra).

Potatoes.—The market has been fully supplied, and only prime freshly-dug lots have been readily taken. At today's sale we offered a fair quantity, nearly all Up-to-dates. For choice lots there was good competition,

and best lines sold at £3 17s 6d to £4 4s. Medium to good consignments had fair competition from shippers, and sold at £3 10s to £3 15s; stale and inferior £2 10s to £3 5s per ton (bags included).

Chaff.—During last week heavy consignments came forward, and it was impossible to deal with these except at a reduction on late values. Nearly all lots on which owners had put reserves had to be discharged into stores as sales could only be effected at a considerable discount on previous quotations. Fortunately there was some outlet for export, otherwise the fall in prices would have been greater. Good to prime outer sheaf was placed in considerable quantities at £3 10s to £3 12s 6d. At yesterday's sale the supply was not so heavy, owing to the weather having interfered with cutting. Prime quality had most competition, and realised £3 12s 6d to £3 15s, one choice truck £3 17s 6d, medium to good £3 5s to £3 10s, light £3 to £3 3s 6d per ton (bags extra).

Messrs. Stronach, Morris, and Co. report:—

Oats.—There has been a good deal coming forward during the last week, and the export demand being good prices have been fully maintained. Good Gartons are in demand, but all bright heavy oats are readily saleable at quotations, medium and inferior lots being harder of sale. Prime milling, 2s 4d to 2s 4½d; good to best feed, 2s 3d to 2s 4d; inferior to medium, 2s 1d to 2s 2d per bushel (sacks extra).

Wheat.—There is a good demand by local millers for velvet, but Tuscan is plentiful, and buyers are not so keen on this kind of wheat. There is a good deal of fowl wheat about, which is readily sold. Quotations: Prime milling, 4s 6½d to 4s 7d; medium to good, 4s 5d to 4s 6d; best whole fowl wheat, 4s 5d to 4s 6d; medium, 4s 3d to 4s 4d; broken and damaged, 3s 6d to 4s 1d per bushel (sacks extra).

Chaff.—There have been very heavy consignments during the week, and prices show a reduction all round. There is a good deal being sold for shipping, and this has tended to keep the price higher than it otherwise would be. Prime outer sheaf brought from £3 7s 6d to £3 12s 6d; medium to good, £3 2s 6d to £3 5s; inferior (very hard of sale), £2 15s to £3.

Potatoes.—The market is fully supplied, and freshly-dug lots are the only ones inquired for. Real good potatoes bring from £3 15s to £3 17s 6d; medium to good, £3 10s to £3 15s; stale and inferior, £2 10s to £3 5s per ton (bags in).

Pressed Straw.—There is a good inquiry for wheaten at from 42s 6d to 45s; oaten, 45s to 47s 6d per ton.

WOOL

Messrs. Stronach, Morris, and Co. report:—

Rabbitskins.—There has been no sale since last report, our next being held on the 13th inst.

Sheepskins.—The next sale will be held on the 14th inst.

Hides.—We held our usual fortnightly sale on the 2nd inst., when we submitted a medium catalogue. There was a good attendance of buyers and competition was fairly good, although there was no appreciable rise in values; in fact, if anything, prices were slightly easier. We had no extra stout hides on offer, but we sold one 63lb hide at 7d per lb, and several lines from 6½d to 6¾d. Our top price for cow hides was 4½d. Prime stout heavy ox hides, 6½d to 7d; good heavy do, 5½d to 6½d; medium, 4½d to 5½d; light weight, 3½d to 4½d; stagg and inferior, 2½d to 3½d; best heavy cow, 4d to 4½d; medium, 3½d to 4½d; light weight, 3½d to 4d; inferior, 1½d to 3½d; yearlings, 2½d to 4d; calfskins, 1½d to 5d.

Tallow and Fat.—Owing to the drop in the London market tallow and fat of all sorts show a slight decline on late values, and all coming forward is readily taken up at quotations. Best rendered tallow, 20s to 22s; medium to good, 17s to 19s 6d; inferior, 12s to 15s; best rough fat, 16s to 18s; medium to good, 11s to 15s.

DUNEDIN HORSE SALEYARDS.

Messrs. Wright, Stephenson, and Co. report as follows:—We had only a medium entry of horses forward for last Saturday's sale. There was a full attendance of the public, and a moderate amount of business was transacted. The scarcity of good, young horses of almost all classes continues, and anything fresh from the country finds ready sale at quotations. The demand for really first-class young draught geldings, suitable for town work, is keen. Spring-van and spring-cart horses are also wanted, and prices for these classes continue good. We quote: Superior young draught geldings at from £45 to £50; extra good
