THE LATEST PRESCRIPTION.



OCTORS differ, and the patient dies. like to see our Anglican and Presbyterian friends, however much they may differ with each other and ourselves, earnestly discussing in synod and assembly the remedy for the evil of godless public instruction which sectarian jealousy and knock-kneed statesmanship combined to inflict upon this young and promising

country. These annual discussions, even where they are of a more or less academic character, show that our separated brethren have not wholly lapsed into spineless apathy over the dread question of the religious up-bringing of the young, our nation's rising hope. On May 8, 1899, the Rev. Dr. LEAVITT roundly declared at the Genesee Baptist Ministers' Conference at Rochester (United States) that the public schools of the country are one of the most prolific sources of infidelity.' Our Protestant fellow-colonists in New Zealand may not have an equally urgent feeling as to the great national danger of training the young New Zealander to spend a goodly portion of his most impressionable years with the name of God and the idea of moral responsibility to an all-seeing Creator walled out from his mind by Act of Parliament. They may not yet realise the urgent need of taking steps to save the souls of our rising generation from the blight of that rampant form of denominationalism-Secularism, to wit-on which our boasted 'undenominational' school system is founded. Catholics have realised all this. They have tucked up their sleeves and set to work, and have been carrying the knowledge and love of the Almighty into the school life of the child. But while they have bravely toiled onwards and upwards during all those weary years, undiscouraged amidst a thousand discouragements, others. more richly endowed with the world's wealth, have been content to split into half a score of little knots, and once a year assemble and discuss the best means of inducing the Government to take upon itself-in addition to the duty of trussing fowls and rearing Aylesbury duck-lings—that of administering to the youth of the Colony daily MATTEI globules of that unknown and undiscoverable quantity, 'unsectarian' Christianity.

Nevertheless these annual discussions serve a useful purpose. They emphasise the rankling sense which many thoughtful Christian people have of the radical blemishes
