### NEW PRESBYTERY AT JOHNSONVILLE

OPENING CEREMONY.

Some two years ago the districts of Johnsonville, Khandallah, Ngaio, Porirua, Ohariu, and Plimmerton were constituted a parish. They were formerly attached to the Lower Hutt parish, which was then administered by the late Dean Lane. The Rev. Father Griffin was appointed rector of the newly formed parish. As there was no residence for the priest it was Father Griffin's first work to secure one, and by means of concerts, euclire parties, donations, etc., he was able to raise approximately £1800. The plans were entrusted to Mr. Williams and the successful tenderer was Mr. T. Moynihan. The location fixed as the headquarters of the parish is Johnsonville, and there a handsome presbyiery in brick was erected.

His Grace Archhishop O'Shea recently blessed and opened the building in the presence of a large assembly. Many of the

clergy were present, among whom were the Very Rev. Fathers Collins, C.SS.R., and O'Reilly, S.M., Rev. Fathers Mahony, S.M., Fay, S.M., Connolly, Cullen, O'Donnell, Lenihan, V. Kelly, Fallon, Fitzgibbon, Mc-Dermott, Day, and Lysaght, S.M.

After performing the religious ceremony his Grace congratulated Father Griffin and the people of the parish on the splendid building which they had erected. He complimented both the architect (Mr. Williams) and contractor (Mr. T. Moynihan) on their work. He also thanked Mr. Felix O'Neill and his sister, Miss O'Neill, for their kindness in providing Father Griffin a home during the period he was without a presbytery. He would have much pleasure in visiting the parish and hoped in the near future to open a school, both of which were necessary. A collection was taken up and realised £160.

At the invitation of Father Griffin those assembled inspected the presbytery and partook of afternoon tea.
