The camp is fitted out with electric lights and most obtainable conveniences. That the Maoris are ingenious, or at all events practical, is illustrated by the fact that when on Christmas Day it became difficult to keep up a constant supply of boiling water for tea, the service of a 200-gallon tank was requisi-tioned. The fire was enlarged to suit the tank, and now the supply of boiling water is just about endless.
