# DIOCESE OF DUNEDIN

There was Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament (transferred from Easter Sunday) at St. Joseph's Cathedral on Sunday last, combined with the monthly meeting of the men's Confraternity of the Sacred Heart. After Compline there was the usual procession and Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

In the Otago Daily Times critique of the performers at the recent concert given by the Dunedin Philharmonic Society, the following appeared in reference to a young vocalist—Miss Kathleen Grave, a pupil of the Dominieum Nuns of St. Dominie's Priory:—"Miss Kathleen Grave sang Godard's beautiful 'Berceuse' exceedingly well, and was assisted by Miss G. Williams, who supplied a vicin obbligato. The worth of Miss Grave's singing was warmly recognised, and besides being the recipient of very handsome bouquets, she was obliged to return to the stage and sing again. Later in the evening Miss Grave sang Schamann's 'Thou Art Like a Lovely Flower' and Meyer-Helmond's 'When a Merry Maiden Glances' quite acceptably.''

Good progress is being made with the memorial scholarships being founded to perpetuate the memory of the late Monsignor Coffey. To afford all an opportunity to show their appreciation of the late pastor's worth—and it is not possible to canvass all likely subscribers—a special collection will be made (with the permission of the Rev. On Easter Sunday, Father McLean was celebrant of the Solemn High Mass, assisted by Fathers O'Connor and Quinn: Father O'Meeghan being master of ceremonies. Father O'Connor preached on the festival of Easter, and in the evening Father McLean preached to a large congregation.
