INCENDIARISM.

£50 REWARD.

Maliciously setting Fire to seven stacks of wheat.

WHEREAS about 11.20. o'clock on the night of the 23rd ult, seven stacks of wheat situate at Flag Swamp, near Waikouaiti, the property of Alexander Annan, were discovered to be on fire, by which they were destroyed. And whereas, at an inquest held on the 27th ultimo, at the Bendigo Hotel, near Waikouaiti, to enquire as to the origin of the said fire, the jury returned the following verdict: "That the stacks were wilfully set on fire by some person or persons at present unknown."

Notice is hereby given that a Reward of £50 will be paid by the Provincial Government of Otago to any person who will first give such information to the Police as will lead to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons by whom the said fire was caused, and His Excellency the Governor will be advised to grant a Free Pardon to an accomplice, not being the person who actually caused the fire, who will give such information as will lead to a like result.

MURDER.

The Body of a Female Child found in a Waterhole or Shaft near Arrowtown.

FIFTY POUNDS REWARD.

WHEREAS on the 9th instant the body of a fully developed Female Child with four punctured wounds in the head, supposed to have been dead between two and four months; was found in a waterhole known as Barracouta Shaft, near Arrowtown. The body was wrapped in a piece of scarlet flannel, covered with white calico, and sewn up in the remains of a pink cotton dress, placed in a pasteboard box, and put into an empty mustard or lozenge tin cannister. And whereas at an inquest held on the same day by H. A. Stratford, Esq., R.M. and Coroner, on the body of the said child, the jury returned a verdict of Wilful Murder against some person or persons unknown,

Notice is hereby Given, that a Reward of £50 will be paid by the Provincial Government of Otago to any person who will first give such information to the Police as will lead to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who caused the death of the said Child, and His Excellency the Governor will be advised to grant a Free Pardon to an accomplice, not being the person who actually caused the child's death, who will give such information as will lead to a like result.

Felonies and other Offences.

Warrants have heen issued by the Invercargill Bench for the arrest of John Campbell Kerr, charged with forging and uttering a promissory note for £20 at Invercargill on the 20th of October last. Offender is a Scotchman, late editor and part owner of the 'Western Star' newspaper, Riverton, about 28 years of age, 5 feet 6 or 7 inches high, slight build, fair complexion, light hair, thin sandy whiskers and moustache, rather thin featuers, blue eyes constantly vacillating, stoops when walking, is addicted to drink and keeps late hours. He left this Province for Melbourne about the end of October last. He is married to the daughter of a man named M'Donald who formerly kept an hotel, but who now keeps a dairy at Morderalloc, which place it is supposed he occasionally visits where it is believed his wife resides with her parents, or with her sister at the same place, who is married to a market gardener.

A warrant has been issued by the Palmerston Bench for the arrest of William G. Hamilton charged with obtaining £20 on the 18th ultimo at Palmerston, from James C. Glassford, by means of a valueless cheque. Offender is a North of Ireland man, a gardener or laborer, 37 years of age (looks younger) 5 feet, 9 inches high, medium build, fresh complexion, brown hair cut short, sandy whisters worn all round, awkward gait; wore dark grey tweed paget coat, and double-breasted vest of same material the lower button of which is generally open, brown and white ribbed tweed trousers, elastic side boots, and black felt hat, frequents hotels and is addicted to drink. He represents himself as nephew to Captain Hamilton, the squatter.

A warrant has been issued by the Invercargill Bench for the arrest of a man, name unknown, charged with obtaining 10s. on the 21st ultimo at Invercargill, from Patrick Silk, by means of a valueless cheque. Offender is about 30 years of age, 5 feet 11 inches high, well built, stout make, auburn whiskers, beard, and moustache, clipped to about two inches long, good looking, dressed in grey clothes pretty well worn, and brownish hat. He was accompanied by a man of low set stature, dressed in dark clothes.

A warrant has been issued by the Dunedin Bench for the arrest of Michael Henry Phelan, charged with deserting his wife and child at Oamaru, on the 21st ultimo. Offender is a Welchman, a laborer, 23 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, stout build, dark whiskers and moustache, chin shaved, wears earrings, dressed in blue sac coat and vest, moleskin trousers, drab hat and blucher boots.

A man of the following description is charged with having assaulted and attempted to rob William Gall, on the Woodhaugh road, near the Water of Leith, Dunedin, between 8 aud 9 oclock on the night of the 3rd instant. Offender is described as being between 30 and 40 years of age, short and stout build, thin features, no whiskers, wore dark coat, white trousers and heavy boots.

William Murphy is charged with having recently (date not given) deserted from Her Majesty's ship "Dido" at Auckland, and for whose arrest £3 reward is offered. He is an Irishman, an able seaman, about 30 years of age, 5 feet 6½ inches high, dark eyes, hair, and complexion, black whiskers and moustache, rolling gait, square build. He was arrested

in January, 1873, by constable Sullivan, at Campbelltown for a similar offence, *Vide* Otago *Police Gazette*, 1872, page 72, and 1873 page 4.

A man of the following description is charged with having wilfully and obscenely exposed his person to Elizabeth Allan, aged 11 years in Albany-street, Dunedin, on the 13th ultimo. Offender is between 30 and 35 years of age, 5 feet 7 or 8 inehes high, rather stout build, round face, dark complexion, dark brown hair, moustache and Yankee beard, dressed in short blue coat, slit in back, blue vest, grey trousers, black round hard felt hat and elastic-side boots, small feet, supposed to be a sailor. Identifiable.

Stolen between the 12th and 18th ultimo from the stable of John Cheqwedpen at Shotover Bridge, an imitation hogskin saddle, about two years in use, a small hole in off knee pad, and a cut across seat, crupper and martingale attached. Value £7. Identifiable.

Suspicion attached to Charles Carson, an Irishman, a farmer, about 40 years of age, 5 feet 10 inches high, dark complexion, dark hair, whiskers, beard and moustache.

Inquests.

An inquest was held on the 10th of February last, at the Pyramids Hotel, Pyramids, by J. N. Wood, Esquire, R.M. and Coroner, on the body of a man, name unknown (supposed to be William Currie, who, it is believed, was drowned on the 17th December last while endeavouring to ford the Waikaia river, near Switzers, on horseback), which was found in the Mataura river, at Knapdale, on the 8th of February. Verdict—Found drowned.

An inquest was held on the 19th of February last, at the North-Western Hotel, Palmerston, by J. W. Murdoch, Esq., R.M. and Coroner, on the body of Thomas Spence, a labourer, aged 20 years, who was killed on the day previous at Palmerston, by the wheel of a dray which he was driving passing over his neck. Verdiet—Accidentally killed.

An inquest was held on the 9th ultimo, at the Court House, Arrowtown, by H. A. Stratford, Esquire, R.M. and Coroner, on the body of a fully developed female child with four punctured wounds in the head, supposed to have been dead between two and four months, which was found in a lozenge tin in a water hole known as Barracouta shaft, near Arrowtown, on that day. Verdict—Wilful murder against some person or persons unknown.

An inquest was held on the 9th ultimo, at the Court House, Tokomairiro, by J. P. Maitland, Esqure, R.M. and Coroner, on the body of William Frederick

Mayhew, a dentist and woodcutter, aged 21 years, whose body was found in Akatore Bush on the day previous, where he is supposed to have died on the 2nd or 3rd ultimo. Verdict: Died while in a state of temporary insanity induced by exposure and intemperance.

An inquest was held on the 11th ultimo, at the Saddle Hill Hotel, Saddle Hill, by T. M. Hocken Esquire, Coroner, on the body of Ah Thung, a shop-keeper, aged 35 years, who was killed there on the 9th ultimo by being thrown from a coach, which capsized. Verdict: Accidentally killed.

An inquest was held on the 16th ultimo, at the Lunatic Asylum, Dunedin, by T. M. Hocken Esquire, Coroner, on the body of Isaac Coxhead, a butcher, aged 45 years, who died there on the previous day. Verdict: Died from general paralysis.

An inquest was held on the 17th ultimo, at the Hospital, Invercargill, by Thomas Perkins, Esquire, J.P. and acting Coroner, on the skeleton of a male person, minus hands and feet, two teeth wanting in front of mouth, supposed to be 30 years old, which was found in the New River on the 14th ultimo. Verdict: That the remains are those of a male person, middle age, but how and by what means death was caused, or to whom the said remains belong, there is not sufficient evidence to show. The remains are believed to be David McArthers, who was drowned at the Ferry, New River, on the 20th December last.

An inquest was held on the 23rd ultimo, at the Commercial Hotel, Milton, by J. P. Maitland, Esquire, R.M. and Coroner, on the body of Patrick Connor, a railway labourer, aged 16 years, who was killed on the day previous at South Tokomairiro by a railway truck, in which he was travelling, falling upon him. Verdict: Accidentally killed.

An inquest was held on the 30th ultimo, at North East Harbour, Peninsula, near Dunedin, by T. M. Hocken, Esquire, Coroner, on the body of Simon Thomas Cooper, a miner, aged 25 years, who was killed there on the day previous while at work in a quarry, by a quantity of stone falling upon him. Verdict: Accidentally killed.

An inquest was held on the 1st instant, at the Court House, Port Chalmers, by David O'Donaghue, Esquire, Coroner, on the body of George Smith, a labourer, aged 54 years, who was killed on the day previous by a fall of earth while at work in a cutting in George-street, Port Chalmers. Verdict: Accidentally killed.

An inquest was held on the 6th instant at the Lunatic Asylum, Dunedin, by T. M. Hocken Esquire, Coroner, on the body of James Simpson, a miner, aged 50 years, who died there on the day previous. Verdict: Died from paralysis.

An inquest was held on the 9th instant, at the Lunatic Asylum, Dunedin, by T. M. Hocken, Esquire, Coroner, on the body of Henry Lutzen, a miner, aged 42 years, who died there on the 6th instant Verdict: Died of exhaustion consequent on acute mania.

Missing Friends.

Information is requested respecting Albert Dimack, an Englishman, a laborer, about 36 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches high, stout build, fair hair, small fair whiskers, wore cord trousers and vest, and old black coat. He was last seen on the 23rd ultimo sitting on the new bridge at Greytown, East Taieri, since which time no trace of him can be found; and as he was then in a desponding state of mind it is feared that he may have drowned himself in the Taieri river

John Quin, the absconding witness in the case of Regina v. Harry Pearce, stealing from the person, has been arrested by Sergeant Hunt, Arrow police, and committed to Dunedin gaol.

Property Found.

hundred and seventy-five.
