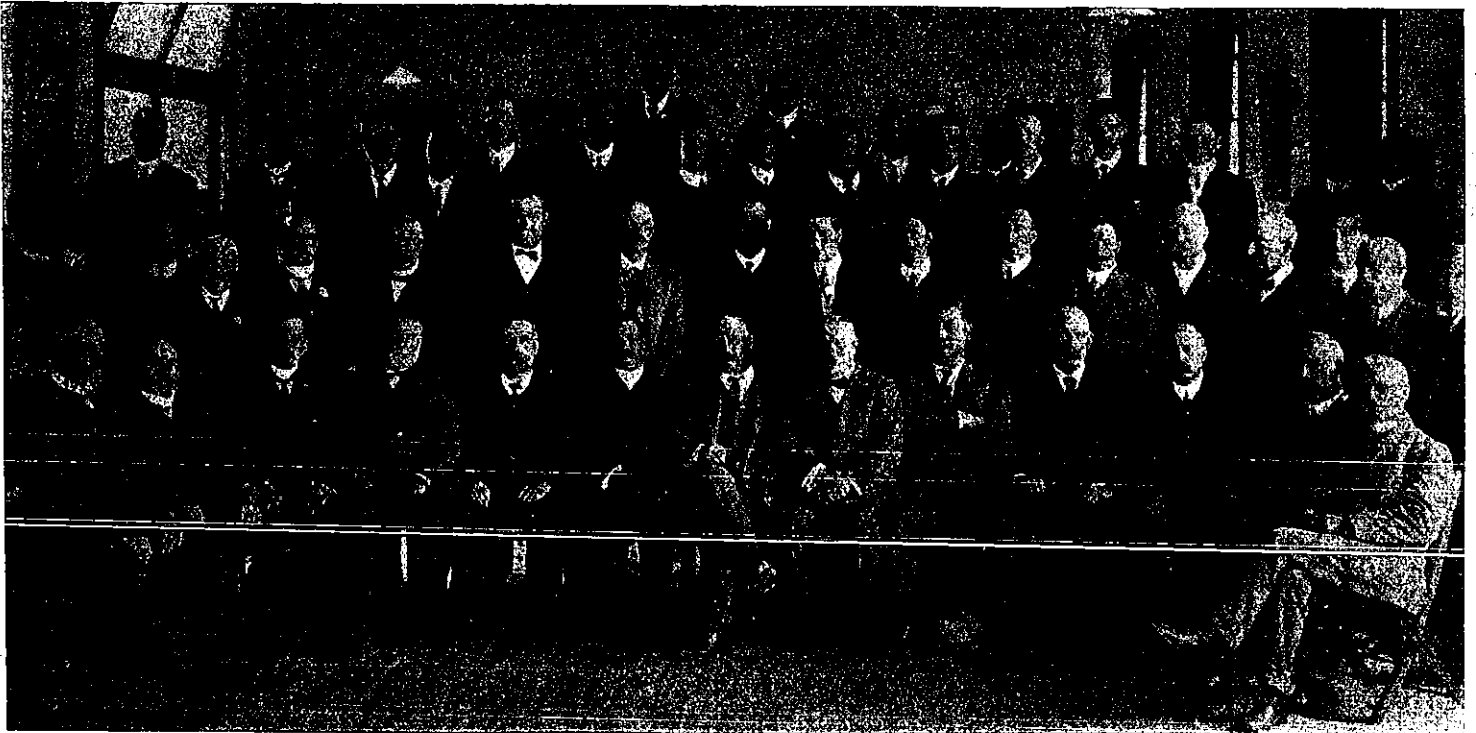
Brother Britons Beyond the Seas.

At the Wellington headquarters of the New Zealand Branch of the Institute of Marine Engineers, there was, in the middle of the month, a notable presentation. Mr. Reddaway (the head of the firm of Reddaway & Co., of Manchester, ironmasters) being struck by some pictures—probably those published in *PROGRESS* some months ago—of the Institute's handsome building lately erected on its commanding site in

Aitken Street, determined to take a hand in the adornment. He accordingly purchased Perron's masterpiece, "Industry" (*Le Travail*), and sent it out to "My Brother Britons beyond the seas." The bronze of the presentation is the statue of a young worker, an ideal figure of Industry, sinewy, strong, graceful, in a moment of repose, as signified by the heavy hammer behind him, but braced alert, ready to resume the interrupted task with cheerfulness, energy and endurance: a magnificent conception of calm force.



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
