evening. They began with complex songs, drums and percussion working around a consistent bass riff. Loose bursts of rhythm were stiffly contained by more familiar chord structures, but this ability and tightness saw the later, more straightforward pieces being delivered with the right amount of invention and tradition. Circus Block 4 were crisp and professional; small efforts within good plans meant real punch and swing.

In comparison, You're A Movie seemed the loud rock regulars, the staple diet of the pub circuit. who danced not only enjoyed themselves but knew the words, often lost in a heavy-handed delivery. Variety between songs generally lay in either a bass or guitar solo and within half an hour the line between consistency and predictability was well

You're A Movie are capable and energetic performers; to be

remembered as anything other than a pub band they'll need a lot

All Fall Down were amusing and interesting, if a little messy, while Legless Brownies' rough post-punk sound showed promise. And then, for a different approach, Crane — guitar bass and drum machine isn't really my cup of tea, too intricate, but they did it quite

Saw a photo of White Boys (awful name) once, thought they were heavy metal 'cos of the bassist's hair (he has a lot of it) but fortunately they're not. This trio's sound revolves around a strong bass/drums axis, with some good guitar work on top. I liked them. Another trio, No Idea are a real

ball of fire — high speed bursts of energy that are surprisingly catchy

, blasting out the classics off their ace tape while the kids down the front are going barmy. Just wish they'd dump the covers, their own

songs are easily superior. Even better were Southern Front. Imaginative bass playing countered with sharp guitar lines and held together by strong drumming provide for a varied but ex-hilirating approach, with Harry in fine voice, delivering convincing lyrics from voicing disgust at rape in the slow, tense 'Silence', to the more energetic tracks. Southern Front display a fresh, vital sound and draw a wide audience to hear it. Their forthcoming Failsafe release sounds excellent.

There was something else? Oh yeah, thanks to the AEB for arranging it all.
