AUCKLAND

February 24 saw the Vision On crew take over Squid for a night and they rocked it. The trance room never really took off, but upstairs in the bar, shit was pumping all night, all the house DJs surpassed themselves, especially Gary Garage, Brother Zed and Clarkee — nice work, lads. Next edition will be at Squid, April 13, with Clarkee, DJ8, Chris W, and G-Spot. The first floor will be a dubby affair, with Dubhead and MC Tuffy with Slowdeck . also on the twenty-fourth and Guy was Hardwired, strictly a hardcore party Ya have to admire their attitude, the flyer read: 'Hardwired will be ridiculously hard there will be no happy rave, no fucking whistles, absolutely nothing to do with the new age and no apologies.' Much respect to Aaron, Mechanism etc. for keeping it real in the hardcore scene ... also on April 13, **Dark Forces** are afoot in the Box, with Aaron, Sam Hill, and residents Greg and Dean ... as we farewell Nathan Haines from the Icebox and indeed the country (go hard, mate!), DJ8 joins Chelsea in the Icebox, Friday and Saturday nights ... there's a new electronic music 'zine out. Called Move. it's strictly for the technoheadz. You can pick it up free from cooler record shops around town ... March 6 saw the Quaff posse present a show on bFM documenting a little bit of house music's rich and varied history ... BPM Records now sponsor Wednesday nights at Celebre (look for some tasty drinks promotions and album releases), which means the finest in classic and classy house cuts (and a smattering of ex-tra smoooth drum 'n' bass) with DJ8, Sam Hill, Albion and Greg Churchill ... The Box will host Chicago's finest trakhead, the amazing DJ Sneak, now confirmed for May 18, and lined up for July, house leg-end Little Louie Vega ... the love 'em or hate 'em Entrain posse rolled though Auckland and did a party on March 2. There was a rumour that Björk would play a set, however, this was either a publicity stunt or just wishful thinking. Apparently, though, because of the heavy rain, someone did get electrocuted. The posse also put on a free party at the Staircase, which was again a hippy, goa trance sort of affair ... as for the **Björk** gig, I dunno, I was impressed, but I expected some rocking dance beats, the crowd were hungry for it, but instead we got way to much slow ballad-type behaviour for my liking - okay, if you're sitting down, but there was a crowd ready for some dance floor action -E-Space on incredible voice though March 8 was cool, even if the scheduled licensed bar was closed down that afternoon due to some legal grey areas after a jealous promoter (no names, but I've heard some rumours and they're ugly) dobbed them in. Talk about bad form though, buddy. This kind of negativity is the last thing we need ... D'Angelo promotions presents another monster holiday weekend, Easter Sunday (April 7) sees Wet 'n Wild at the Waterfront Bar. with those super foam machines and lots of babes in bikinis and hunks in trunks. Squid hosts The Resurrection, another Cheap Sex, with all the usual deviant stage acts (like the truly frightening Madame Kitty), cheap and slutty DJs (Sample Gee, Sam Hill and DJ8), and the amazing body piercer, Dr Shylo. Tix are strictly limited to 300, so be quick. Down at The Box/Celebre it's the very last ever Retro-a-Go-Go, with an all star line up of previous retro spinners (ya cheesezoids!). A mystery superstar guest will arrive by limo at about 11PM to perform a few numbers, and Love Sector 6 play live in Celebre. Again, tix are strictly limited to 400, and you know this will sell out. Hey, there's even a breakdancing competition, so you know I'll be there ... always stylin' Crow Bar is going back to its underground roots. They have implemented a more progressive musical

approach, moving away from anything commercial towards deep house, triphop, and the odd excursion into drum 'n bass with the (should be cool) seperate Lounge Bar set to open above the Crow in about six weeks. It will be a plush, intimate, chill-out bar to complement the Crow's late night, late party activities there's also lots happening at Hotel De Brett. The Spin Bar opens April 4, with Andy Vann and guest MC's Bobbylon and Johnny D, April 12 is the opening of the Redzone Bar, with G-Spot and DJ8, and from April 18 every Thursday in the Redzone bar genuine ex-pat UK DJs playing UK house ... The Brain is back in action hosting the Nightraver and DJ Trevor of DyeWitness (Holland). Check em at The Box, April 11, and at The Brain itself, where they will play a two hour DJ/MC set. The Powerstation. April 12, pre-sales from BPM, Paris Texas, Route 66 ... Armageddon Dance (music for the acid generation) at The Foundry was a good rave. Pots, 48 Sonic, DJ8, Slimmatt, Pauly and Gideon played to an enthusiastic crowd and lots of kids doing look out for The X Files on amyl Wednesday April 24, at The Box/Celebre, with trip-hop/drum 'n' bass in Celebre, with DLT, Stinky Jim and DJ8, and trance/acid/techno in The Box, with Sam Hill, Albion and Sample Gee (more DJs to be confirmed) ... Jungle Sound Clash in the Voodoo lounge was a ripper. For the first time at a drum 'n' bass party some ragga jungle DJs were on the bill. but the mix worked well. The usual jungle massive showed up for some jump up dancefloor action. More drum 'n' basswise antics in the Voodoo Lounge are set for May 4, and possibly sometime in April a drum 'n' bass evening with a certain UK female DJ who warms up for Metalheadz stars - Hidden Agenda. kay, here's the scenario: I'm on the dancefloor at Bob, getting low down and funky to the serious sounds of one of the drum 'n' bass-wise parties. I don't know who is deejaying and don't really care, 'cause the sub bass has me hypnotised and swooning in rhythmic pleasure, while the chopped up breaks make my arms lace the air in machine gun rhythms. Yeah, baby, this is the sound of the underground and it's time to get the fuck down.

Through the haze of dry ice and strobe light I spot three guys hunched over a rack of keyboards, samplers, and associated digital hardware. They are cautiously observing the crowd while they furiously work their machines, conjuring up the sound of the feared mutant alien Insectatrons engaged in cyber warfare against the noble guardians of the Delta Quadrant. It is indeed a live performance by possibly New Zealand's only live junglists - step up, the enigmatic Baiter Cell.

Fast forward to the place I know as reality, and it finds me back in my favourite cafe (it's the bitchy staff I guess), sitting with a certain DJ/promoter/junglist who goes by the name of D-Rave.

Yo' D, just who are Baiter Cell?

"Baiter Cell are myself, Chris and Patrick."

You're a trance DJ and, without putting to much emphasis on it, I understand Chris and Patrick are in a death metal band. What the hell are you three doing writing drum 'n' bass?

"Well, I used to be a break beat DJ, but at the time the music was very raw, and I somehow metamorphosised into a trance DJ. We thought we could take the break beats of hardcore, bring in more melodies and atmospherics, and hopefully arrive at a fuller sound."

What do you think of the current sounds of drum 'n' bass?

"Awesome. The melody is back, there's a lot more going on in each track. Jungle seems to have split up into different styles; some rely on the break beat while others concentrate on the melody. I must say, though, the jungle I prefer is the darker stuff." In the UK jungle has gone mega. What do you think of the state of New Zealand's drum 'n' bass scene?

> "Well, not to be negative, but there's too many people dissing different styles of jungle. There are a lot of people who moan about people not listening to jungle and being close minded, but who, at the same time, are close minded themselves to other forms of jungle, which is just hypocritical. We're at such an early stage of development of the jungle scene that it's just pointless to be dissing people.

Back to Baiter Cell, you are primarily a live act - where do you play?

"We've done over 15 live gigs at lots of underground parties that don't get promoted, we played at a lot of the Great North Road parties, the drum 'n' bass-wise events, some of the Stomping parties, and the first gig we ever did was as support for Reel 2 Reel early last year, although we did more of a ravey techno set that night."

What's the future for Baiter Cell?

"Well, we would like to release something on vinyl. We're fairly casual about it, we don't take ourselves too seriously, but it would be good to see the Auckland jungle scene get bigger and stronger so there are more parties, because we all love the music."

You said it D, we surely do. Stay tuned for more jungleicious parties coming your way ---chances are Baiter Cell will be on the bill. They intend to tour the South Island late May, early June, and seriously, they are not to be missed. ANDY PICKERING
