A PROCLAMATION,

Requiring the Attendance of the Members of both Houses of Parliament.

Whereas by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the fifth Day of June last, We thought fit to Declare and Appoint, That Our first Parliament of Great Britain should meet and be holden at Our City of Westminster on Thursday the Twenty third Day of October next, We do hereby (With the Advice of Our Privy-Council) Declare and Publish Our Will and Pleasure to be, That Our said Parliament shall, on the said Twenty third Day of October, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and Important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby Required and Comanded to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Twenty third Day of October next.

Given at Our Court at *Windsor* the Eighth Day of *September*, 1707.
In the Sixth Year of Our Reign.
