THE BISHOP'S DECISION

After thinking carefully over my responsibility to and for the lambs of the flock and the great difficulty of finding out the real standard of knowledge possess d by the children in the Sunday and other schools of the Diocese which come under my spiritual charge, I have decided to hold a special examination this year, and to set the papers myself.

- (1) The examination will be held at the same time and under similar conditions to the ordinary Diocesan examination, viz., at the beginning of Advent.
- (2) The examination will consist of a paper for senior and junior divisions on "The New Testa-Catechism and the Chief Seasons

- (3) The junior division will consist of children under thirteen years of age, and the senior division of children over thirteen years of age.
- (4) The questions will be simple, 11.15 a.m., in order to ascertain what the children know.
 - (5) The clergy and superintendents are requested to see that arrangements are made for as many children as possible to enter for the examination.
 - The junior division will be expected to know the Catechism to the end of the Commandments, with simple explanations, and the senior division will be examined on the whole of the Catechism.
- (7) Clergy or superintendents will kindly send to Archdeacon Ruddock, Napier, at least a tort-The clergy are invited to robe in night before the examination is held, the number of examination papers required for senior and junior candidates, and also forward to him the answers immedi-
