of £80.

The Vicar in his letter to the Parishioners said that he yearned for two improvements in the present year—better attendance at the Holy Communion services because that is the index of our spiritual growth and better attendance at the special services in Lent.

Altogether it was a very happy meeting, and perhaps the best annual meeting we have held for some years.
