On Thursday, 13th June, we duly kept the jubilee of the signing of the Constitution of the Church of the Province of New Zealand. At the conclusion of Holy Communion in St. Luke's at 10.30 a.m. there were twenty-six communicants. The Vicar was assisted by the Rev. F. A. Bennett. In the evening at 8 o'clock a social gathering was held in the Parish Hall, which was splendidly attended, one hundred and eighty people being present. The proceedings were opened with the singing of the "Old Hundredth," followed by prayer, and then the hymn "The Church's One Foundation," after which the Vicar called on Mr Bennett to address the meeting on the early history of the Church in New Zealand. Mr Bennett illustrated his address with a number of lantern slides, and was listened to with the greatest attention. The members of the choir then rendered an item, after which the Vicar addressed the meeting, and explained Bishop Selwyn's position when he first came to the colony, how under his careful guidance the principles of a constitution were thought, and after many difficulties at last embodied and set forth. Reference was also made to the Pan-Anglican Conference, to be held in London next year. Those present then joined in singing the hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers," after which Mr David London gave a short address, giving reminiscences of early church life in Auckland. After refreshments had been handed round, and the hymn "The day Thou gavest Lord is ended" had been sung, the Vicar gave the Benediction and closed one of the heartiest and most enthusiastic church meetings that has ever been held in Rotorua.

The Rev. F. Bennett repeated his lecture in his Mission Hall at Ohine-

mutu on the Sunday evening following for the benefit of the Maori congregation of St. Faith's, and also a day or two after in his Mission Hall at Whakarewarewa. On Sunday, the 16th, very hearty services were held in St. Luke's in connection with the Jubilee Thanksgiving.
