Any little share any of us are privileged to have in the healing of the nations, must begin by our consenting that the divisive delusion shall be cast out of our minds, conscious or sub-conscious. The "Old man"the separatist, the mischief-maker must be put off; in order that the "new man"-the peace-maker-the uniter-the Christ in us-the One Divine Humanity-may be our very Self and Life and Power.

There is something that every regenerate soul can do for the peace of the world-something that no Government in London, or Paris, or any other capital, can hinder. It is an activity in the spiritual realm of causation. It is to receive and radiate the peace of the Eternal Love-Centre.
