## The Mhite Ribbon.

WELLINGTON, APRIL 18, 1922.

Again Convention has come and gone. It was a record for numbers, 112 delegates answering the Roll Call. The officers of the Hamilton Union did everything in their power to render the visitors happy and comfortable, and spared no effort.
