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SELECTION-ELECTION.

Before another issue of our paper, our readers will have been called upon to elect their representatives for Parliament. For the first time for over a quarter of a century there will be no Licensing Poll with the Electoral Poll. This will enable voters to concentrate their efforts upon getting suitable men or women to represent them. All White Ribboners should feel how necessary this is, and should realise their responsibility as Christian citizens, Miss Willard said, "As Thrist sat over against the Temple and watched the widow cast in her two mites, so He now sits beside the ballot box and sees what is placed there.' Before recording her vote, every White Ribboner should ascertain how candidates are likely to vote on vital questions. In every electorate our Unions should see that candidates are asked how they will vote on certain vital questions. We would suggest that our Unions arrange that the candidates be asked the following questions, and it would be advisable to ask them at the pre-election meetings:-

- Will you vote against any extension of time between the Polls?
- 2. Will you vote for a two-issue ballot paper, with a bare majority?
- 3. Will you oppose any legislation calculated to increase the facilities for the sale of liquor?
- 4. Will you oppose any measure to allow the removal of licenses beyond the limits now allowed by the law?
- 5. Will you support the present pact in regard to the King Country being maintained?

It is one of the most important duties of a citizen to record his or her vote on election day. We are responsible for the character of our Parliament. Now

is the time to consider earnestly the record of those who solicit our vote, and give our vote to men or women who will support the reforms we are working so hard to win.

There are very "wet" politicians in Parliament sent there by the votes of good Prohibitionists. This should not be

THE POSTPONED POLL.

Dear Editor,-

We have been hearing the expression of a great deal of disappointment about the postponement of the Licensing Poll; therefore I am writing to ask if we cannot see our way to regard the postponement as a challenge to renewed work, rather than as a call to become slack and listless. We have had disappointments before, and got over them, and we have no cail to be downcast now. There is an Election coming -surely it is our business to see that honest, sound men, who have the country's welfare at heart, are elected to Parliament. May I suggest that, each member of our Unions would spend sixpence (a shilling, if possible) on literature which she can and will distribute during the summer, necessarily house to house work, but to those with whom she comes in contact, we shall have a very fine foundation laid for educational work next year. If the members of each Union clubbed together, they could obtain a really fine parcel of literature for free distribution for the modest sum of 2/6, and there are some very good leaflets in the Literature Department at Headquarters.

Much prayer and faithful distribution of literature will go far to win the Victory we all long for.

Dear Sisters and all Temperance Friends,-

The Election for Members of Parliament will almost certainly take place

the first week in December.

Many times I am asked, "What can we do to help in the cause of Prohibition, now that we are to have no Poll on the question?"

My reply is-That there are most important issues at stake for this very election to settle. Now that the Statute Law has been amended to postpone the Poll and give the drink traffic a longer lease of life, we may be sure that all will be done to return to Parliament men willing to give more and yet more concessions to this traffic. Nine years between the Polls, 8 o'clock closing in place of 6 o'clock, removal of licenses, will all be aimed at and asked for, unless we are up and doing.

Unless we see to it that the right men and women are returned-men and women staunch to the cause we all love and stand for-men and women loyal to the hard-won victories of the pastand to our demands for the future, the bare majority, a two-issue ballot paper, and no more tampering with the triennial Poll.

Our clear responsibility is to find out, in each Electorate, which are the candidates who will support our demands; then, if necessary, but all party issues on one side, and, for this time at least, vote for those who will give us a clear field, with no favours to the liquor traffic.

White Ribboners! Before God and for the sake of the Nation, the Race and the Home, this is your plain, unmistakable duty! Do it now, and future years will prove your wiscom.

UNEMPLOYED WOMEN.

The Parliamentary Watch Committee of the Dominion National Council of Women waited upon Hon. J. G. Coates on Friday, November 12th, in regard to unemployed women.

Mrs Suckling, President of the weilington Branch, introduced the deputation, and spoke of the delay in making available for use the report which had been submitted to the Board by the Unemployment Committee.

Miss C. E. Kirk spoke upon the great need there was for something to be done specially for the relief of women and young girls. She knew personally of many mothers, with their children, who were stinted in food and short of necessaries of life. She urged the Minister to do somethting to provide work for these women and girls.

Mrs Peryman followed, and stressed the justice of the women's claim. Women were compelled to pay the unemployment tax, and it was only just that they should derive some benefit from it. Women were doing much to help their distressed sisters. The registration was done by Mrs Hunter and Mrs Forde, two members of the Committee; also, other members, under the direction of Mrs Line, took charge of a shop where work done by unemployed worken and girls was set out for sale. In three weeks over £75 had been paid to the women for their work sold. The fact that women were now taxed for the unemployed lessened the sum they were able to contribute voluntarily.

Mr Coates gave the deputation a very sympathetic hearing. He paid a warm tribute to the band of voluntary workers, and said how much such labour lessened the cost of administration. He was giving his earnest attention to the problem. The funds available were not very large for what was needed. He was prepared to consider any suggestions put forward by the Committee.

Wellington District Annual Convention, held in Knox Hall, Masterton, on Thursday, October 1st.

Thirteen out of the 14 Unions were represented. The delegates were received and welcomed by Mrs. Blamires, Letters of sympathy were sent to Mrs Wood, who had lost her husband; our beloved Dominion President, hoping for her speedy recovery; and to Mrs. Anderson (Treasurer) hopes for her recovery and thanks for nine , ears' of faithful stewardship, and regret that she was no longer able to carry on. Mrs. Peryman was thanked for her untiring efforts for the success of "White Ribbon," and it was earnestly hoped that, very soon, finance would improve sufficiently to allow of more help.

keen regret was expressed by all that the Alliance should have approached the Government and asked for a postponement of the Licensing Poll. Eleven delegates were appointed to the N.C.W. Very encouraging reports were received from the Unions, showing that they were very much alive and in earnest. In the afternoon, the Ministers of the District came to offer a welcome; they were pleasingly surprised at the large gathering (about 60); each Minister spoke for two minutes, and they were encouraging and helpful. The President, Mrs. Every, voiced the thanks of all the delegates to the Masterton ladies, who had spared neither labour nor expense, and had provided lavishly for their comfort.

So ended a very happy day. Perhaps, the best of all was the wenderful atmosphere—a deeply religious optimism.

MARLBOROUGH DISTRICT CONVENTION.

Convention called to order at 10.30 by the District President (Mrs. W. B. Wilson). Very fitting words of welcome and good cheer were extended to the members by Rev. Stockwell (Methodist), Rev. J. D. Madill (Presbyterian), Rev. Saunders (Church of England), Rev. Milgrew (Church of England, Havelock), and Mrs. Wyatt for Salvation Army. Mrs. W. B. Wilson, President, thanked all for their good wishes and cheery messages which, she felt sure, indicated a good start for a

successful Convention. The sun shone gloriously, as if to combine with them in their welcome. She introduced Miss Kirk, Dominion Recording Secretary, and welcomed all the visiting delegates, including the "Y's." Sincere regret was expressed at the illness of our much-loved President, Mrs. T. E. Taylor, and prayers were offered for her speedy recovery. Mrs. W. M. Smith, Blenheim President, presented Miss Kirk and Mrs. Wilson with beautiful bouquets, on behalf of the members.

The morning Devotions were taken by Miss Kirk, who exhorted all to go forward faithfully, realising that God was working through them, and stressed great encouragement to all. Mrs. Madill led in prayer.

Greetings read, including one from Blenheim "Y's," "Be ye faithful unto death, and I will give you a crown of life."

District Secretary's Report and Treasurer's Balance-Sheet read and adopted. District President gave a short resume of year's work amongst the branches—those that were not visited were kept in touch with by correspondence. Canvastown had had no meeting since the big flood, on account of the bridges being down, but was in hopes of starting again very shortly.

The reports of all the branches showed progress in the work, and the new "Y." Branch at Tua Marina was congratulated on winning the Banner for most members gained during the year.

Afternoon Devotions by Mrs. Stockwell. A very hearty vote of thanks for her address carried by acclamation.

OBITUARY.

MRS. J. E. PEILLIPS, WARK-WORTH.

It is with deep regret that we record the passing of Mrs. J. E. Phillips on October 5th, at the comparatively early age of 53 years—years so full of usefulness! yet called for higher service!

Born in Port Albert, of pioneer parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hefford, and brought up with Christian and Temperance principles and ideals, she has faithfully followed in His steps.

Mrs. Phillips was a School Teacher for some years before her marriage, being stationed at Dome Valley School, where she met and married Mr. Herbert I. Phillips.

Her husband, two daughters and a son, are left to mourn their loss. To them we tender our deepest sympathy.

Mrs. Phillips has been Fresident of the Warkworth Branch of the W.C.T.U. since 1925, ably filling the position. She has been so whole-heartedly interested in all branches of the work, and has so won the love and esteem of all those who worked with her, that all members feel at a loss to fill her place—but,

"There's a wideness in Goda' mercy, Like the wideness of the sea; There's a kindness in His justice, Which is more than liberty.

"There is no place where earth's sorrows

Are more felt than up in Heaven; There is no place where earth's failings Have such kindly judgment given.

MRS .WALL, WAVERLEY.

The death of Mrs. Wall, of Waverley, took place on Tuesday evening, October 13th inst., and has cast a gloom upon the whole district. She was a lady of fine Christian principles, and of deep spiritual convictions. Her passing removes from our ranks one of our most ardent advocates of the Prohibition Movement, and creates a vacancy that is going to be extremely difficult to all. For some years, and up to the time of her death, she was President of our local branch of the W.C.T.U., also Leader of the L.T.L. She was unwearying in her labours of love among the young, and we feel sure that the good seed of Temperance principles she planted in the young life will, in after years, bear abundant fruit. In every form of Christian work she took a deep and active interest.

The funeral took place on Thursday, 15th inst., and the large display of floral tributes bore eloquent tribute, not only to her work and worth, but to the high regard in which she was held by all. Some of the Executive from Wanganui also took part at the grave-side.

MISS J. E. MAUNDER.

The death occurred on Tuesday, 27th, at the ags of 88, of Miss Maunder, the much-loved and esteemed Vice-President of the Auckland Union. She was absent from the last Union meeting. otherwise she has ever been in her place, when her health permitted, on the second Tuesday. An excuse was never a reason with her, age did not prevent her from attending regularly. Her deeply spiritual nature and gracious, kindly, spirit will be an untold loss to our Union, and to the Temperance Cause, of which she was an ardent exponent. Her work as a teacher made her widely-known.

Born in London, she came to Auckland in 1870, and engaged in teaching for a number of years. She then moved to Hawera, where she established a private school. As a resident of Hawera for 35 years, she made a wide circle of friends. A stauch member of the Presbyterian Church, she entered into every form of Christian activity, being a devoted Sunday School Teacher, and taking an active interest in Missions. Miss Maunder was the last of her family.

During the past ten years she lived at Mount Eden and Remuera, and, at the time of her death, she was visiting with her cousin, Mrs. E. D. Wright, of Warrington Road, Remuera. We mourn the loss of an honoured comrade.

SISTER MOODY BELL.

Many White Ribboners will regret to hear of the passing of Sister Moody Bell. For many years she laboured in New Zealand in the W.C.T.U. work. For a short period she was Dominion Recording Secretary. As a Methodist Home Missionary, she was in charge of the Foxton-Shannon Circuit. Some years ago she returned to England, but never lost her interest in the work in New Zealand. For some time she suffered from cough and breathlessness, but bravely kept about, until a fortnight before the end came. On Thursday morning, September 10th, she was very bright and cheerful, and enjoyed a visit from her cousin; but in the afternoon she passed over to the Gloryland. Among her last words were, "I shall soon be over the border." The Rev. Ezra Kendall conducted the funeral service, and spoke feelingly of her long and useful life. Her room was filled with wreaths, crosses, and sheaves of beautiful flowers, and a large congregation assembled in Wesley Chapel to pay their last tribute of affection. Upon her coffin was this simple inscription: "Emma Louisa Bell. At Rest. Sept. 10, 1931."

THE MAORI RACE.

ADDRESS DELIVERED AT N.E. VALLEY UNION.

Mr. Hemi Potatau, a Maori Divinity Student, who intends working among the Maoris at Taupo, spoke of the disastrous effect of liquor on the Maori race. Before the coming of the Pakeha, intoxicating drinks were unknown. They were a strong people, physically and morally, but, with the introduction of alcohol, they became demoralized, and the present race is not what it used to be. The Maori is a man of today and not of to-morrow. The money earned in the shearing sheds is spent on drink instead of on their families. The W.C.T.U. has a great responsibility to the Maori people. The prayers of the Union were asked for a new Maori Men's Club that has been formed, called the "Upward Movement," the main object of which is the abolition of intoxicating drink.

Alcohol turns our young manhood and womanhood into brutes; children are damned before birth by alcohol. None of our famous athletes take it, nor do our airmen "fly" on it. The Liquor Traffic injures the home, is useless. As every useless thing goes, so that has got to go. If a man gets hurt on a building, he can get damages, but the Liquor Traffic is not prosecuted for injuring men, women and children. Why a Christian Union? Our Business Manager suggests a lightning campaign for new subscribers to our official organ. Many of our sisters are feeling hard times, and have written regretting the necessity for stopping their sub. for a time. Now, unless our paper has the support of our Unions it will not be possible to carry on. We must get out to a wider constituency, and get them interested in the work of the W.C. Let every White Ribboner ask her neighbour and her friend for help at this time. The brave women of the past worked and sacrificed to give us our "White Ribbon." Let us be prepared to carry on the good work.

We suggest that every Union and every District study the summary given below, and particularly the work of their own branch. If they are not satisfied, there is time to improve their standing No branch need be reported at Convention as a defaulter. How many new subscribers can each Union report at next Convention?

Since last Convention, in North Auckland district six Unions secured 16 new subscribers, while three Unions gained no new ones. In Auckland, nine Unions gained 20, while 15 did nothing. In S.

Auckland, five Unions gained ten, while eight returned no new subscribers; Wanganui, three Unions, gained eight, while five gained none; Manawatu, one Union gained one subscriber, while eight got no new ones; Taranaki, six Unions gained eight, while three did nothing; in Wellington five Unions gained eight new subscribers, while 12 gained none; in Marlborough, three Unions gained 11, and four gained none; In Nelson, four Unions gained five, and two gained none; N. Canterbury, five Unions sent in 10 new subscribers, and 22 sent in no new subscriber; in S. Canterbury, six Unions gained 12, while five did nothing; in Otago, three Unions gained eight, and nine gained none; in Southland, two gained six, while 12 gained none.

In the Dominion, 58 Unions sent in 123 new subscribers, while 108 Unions never sent in one new subscriber.

Maungakaramea heads the list for the Dominion, with seven new subscribers.

We are sure no district will be proud of its record. But much other work has kept Unions busy. The recess gives a chance to help our paper. Many Unions pay for a copy to be sent to their Library. "White Ribbon" brought over 40 answers to the Editor, and only one of the writers was on the subscribers' list; others had read it in a Library or Rest Many Unions help by paying for several copies and distribute them. Brooklyn, Grey Lynn, and Upper Hutt sell 12 each month; Ngaruawahia, 9; Ponsonby, 8; Onehunga, Auckland Y's, Lower Hutt, Petone, Carterton, Remuera, and Pukekohe, 6; Mt. Eden, Ashburton Y's, and New Plymouth, 3; and Waipawa, 2.

Bermondsey, one of the poorest working class districts in London, had a drink bill of £1,335,000 for 1924, of which about 86 per cent. was for beer sales only. That huge sum could have provided every child in the Borough with an extra pint of milk every day in the week, a new suit of clothes, including a pair of boots, and a fortnight's holiday by the sea, and there would still be £1,000,000 for the Council to use in providing homes. "With Bermondsey's annual drink bill we could buy up the Borough," said Dr. Salter, M.P. for the district, "and make it all public property, without increasing the rates one penny."
