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VISIONS and VISIONARIES

As a mere word, "vision" is lovely. Its sound is musical. It calls up immediate pictures of dreamlike charm. As children, we felt that the "transformation scene" at the Christmas pantomine was the very embodiment of all the imagined enchantments in the special dream world inhabited by us alone. Veiled in mysterious, floating gossamer, exquisite beings appeared to float in a mist of shining, evanescent, frail colour dissolving and reforming before our entranced sight. So utterly beautiful did it all appear that speech failed; and only deep sighs expressed the almost too intense ectasy. It was not till later that we realised that the muslin and tinsel, the paint and cardboard, could not serve the deeper need growing up within that being that was ourselves. But there had been a vision of something be-yond the possibility of every day life, -something that held promise for the small mind, of worlds outside the ordinary; and life was enriched and beautified thereby.

But, "vision," as we think of it in later days, implies the glory and thrill of the realised Ideal. All the dreams and longings, the hopes and desires by which the eager seeking heart is led on the way to its high development, have their culmination in that "vision splendid." Like the towers of a distant city, set high up among the mists and mountain peaks, it is not always clear. Sometimes it seems to disappear altogether, till the sun shines again, the vapours drift away, and the inward eye sees once more.

But, if the vision is ever to become even a faint reality, there must be the will to do more than gaze on its beauty. He who is content to do this is merely a "visionary;" that is, an ineffective dreamer. The world has seen many such as these. They are laughed to scorn. But, when the will to bring about the actual existence of the lovely dream is "translated into action," as Madame Chiang Kai Shek says, there is respect and sometimes co-operation on the part of others. Even when there is not, because it is not everyone who sees the same vision; there is a firm foundation for the raising of the structure which began with a dream.

Let us in our working, planning, and hoping, keep the vision undimmed. That it may never become reality does not greatly matter. The point is that we shall work, plan and hope so much more beautifully because of it. The cries of those who do not see it will not dismay us. We have seen a ray of the light that never was on sea or land; and though we may seem to those who have missed the lovely gleam, to be foolish followers of an unreal myth, we know that to be dreamers of dreams and seers of visions is the prerogative of those who will strive to win the glory of which the vision is only the faint foreshadowing.

"On June 12th, 1947, Miss Catherine McLay addressed thirty Maori women at the Methodist Church, on the evils of liquor, and the Aims and Ideals of the W.C.T. Union. As a result of this gathering, the Te Kuiti Branch of the Union was formed with twenty-three Foundation members. The membership list now stands at thirty-eight, a good number of these

being country residents.

The Cracle Roll numbers sixtythree. Three having turned eight years leaves sixty on the list. Twentythree birthday cards have been sent

Work Among Seamen: Ten bags, with eight cakes of soap, have been forwarded to Mrs. Gardiner by Mrs. Hose, our Seamen's Work Superin-

Youth Work is as yet in the initial stages, but a start has been made.

Patients at the Hospital have been visited by the Hospital visitor; and flowers and fruit have been provided.

Temperance Facts are a feature of our meetings; also educational talks on health, the detrimental effect of liquor imbibing in restaurants; the screening of an educational film by Miss McLay dealing with the poisonous effects of liquor drinking on the body and its organs, have been successfully incorporated into our monthly meetings.

Two "Bring and Buy" functions have been held in the dining hall of the Pa, to supplement the Union's finances.

The President, Treasurer and Evangelistic Superintendent were able to attend the District Convention at Tauranga on September 18th. Our Union was in the happy position of being able to defray all expenses involved.

Some of our members attended the Pakeha Union's "Bring and Buy" at the Presbyterian Church; and many more combined with the other local Unions; and took part in a combined reception to Mrs. Christian, led by our

TRAVEL TIPS

In the past year I have been to Auckland and to the Bluff and to many places between. Conferences have called me to travel and my hotel allocations have been varied. I have stayed in a number of liquor-selling hotels and a number of hotels not selling liquor. The accommodation in the latter is quite equal to the licensed house and it was in an unlicensed house that I heard travellers say the food was the best of all. I disagree with two who said that hospitality and warmth of companionship was not as good in the hotels under control of the Invercargill Licensing Trust. I found no difference between these and other licensed hotels. The most companionable hotel I stayed at was an unlicensed house in Tauranga, where the travelling public appeared to be of a special type (or was it the climate?).

STAND UP, OR SIT DOWN BARS

I have stayed in hotels where "sit down" or "stand up" bars, one or the other, were in use. I have seen the lounge in full blast and in quiet operation, and the open-to-street bar and the hidden-entrance bar. I have heard the varied opinions of many drinkers in these places, and I must say tost my considered opinion is that lounge, "sit down," and concealed

drinking will increase the consumption of alcoholic liquors. I have while waiting for dinner in a lounge noticed a gentleman bring two ladies into the room and in the half hour they consumed three rounds of liquor. I have seen many young women enter the door leading to the concealed bar and very many of that sex drinking freely in lounges. Does the liquor seller look at it thus-

"Grab, Guzzle, Get," Bars we abhor, Sit, sip and soak, thus spend much

more?

BOTTLE SHOPS

A great incentive to "Home Drinking" is, in my opinion, the Bottle Shop. With windows attractively spread with bottles of alcoholic liquor bearing price tickets varying from 1/9 per bottle and up to 15/- per bottle, they ask for trade. 1/9 per bottle is also shown as 20/6 per dozen, thus saving a whole halfpenny per bottle. I noticed that seldom did anyone come out with a package (always done up in brown paper) with but one bottle in it. Business appeared to be brisk. Down in Invercargill I noticed empty beer bottles at both ends of the Railway Station platform and on arriving at an hotel found a bottle in my wardrobe when I opened it to hang up my things. One Bottle Shop (open on Saturday when grocers are closed) was next door to a picture theatre and another was close to Rugby Park sports ground. The profit on that one is shown in the published balance sheet as £295—and Rugby Park sales of liquor are given as £2,804—I saw a large bottle brought to a dining table by the lounge liquor server. Coffee was not served at dinner, but in the lounge.

LIQUOR IN TEAROOMS

I have a long experience of tearooms and have seen them in many towns. I visited the one in Inver-cargill conducted under the Licensing With a farmer I sat down Trust. in the Brown Owl, as it is named, and had afternoon tea. It was a busy Friday shopping afternoon and trade was brisk. White jacketed Liquor-vending Waiters flitted around and girls were serving the afternoon teas. My farmer friend although not an abstainer did not appreciate the dual purpose of the place. He assured me that since the introduction of Liquor selling his wife refused to patronise the room. I met others who declined to enter the place. The published balance sheet gave the Restaurant income as £30,134, and liquor sales in the same room as £9,223. with a loss for the year of £1,683 It is proposed now to open a Bottle shop adjacent to sell wines only.

Where the man who was staggering wildly up the street obtained his intoxicants I do not know, but of this I am convinced, that the sale of liquor in a tearoom is objectionable and has dangers, which make it very undesirable.

SPECIAL PUBLIC MEETING. WINTON UNION

On December 2nd, a special meeting was held at Winton Sunday School Hall, when Mr. George Dash, of Waimate, was the speaker, his subject "General Conditions in being the Liquor Trading." Twenty-five visitors had travelled by bus from Invercargill to be present. Mrs. Thomson, Union President, took the chair, and Miss Jamieson, District President, took the Devotional reading, Mrs. Holmes of Invercargili leading in prayer. Mrs. Thomson then warmly welcomed all present and asked them to stand in answer to their names to be introduced to each other.

Mr. Dash gave his address in a very able manner, giving a very full account of the terrible happenings caused by the influence of liquor. Mrs. Thom-son thanked the speaker, assuring him that the Winton Union would do all possible to carry on the good work of the W.C.T.U. Mrs. Wilson endorsed these remarks. A recitation was then given by Mrs. Middlemiss, of Invercargill. The meeting closed with the reading of the Pledge, Hymn and Benediction pronounced by Miss Jamiesor, tea being served later.

6. What liquor do they sell?-Whatever is asked for, beer, wine or spirits.

7. What do W.C.T.U. members think of restaurant drinking?-They

view it as a real menace.

8. Do any depots sell liquor in addition to the hotels?—Yes, there are several bottle stores; and this morning's paper contains an advertisement that two more are to be opened, both in residential areas. Two of the "hotels" are straight-out drinking places, being merely bars and lounges for drinking in. They are spoken of as the "pig-troughs."

9. What do you think of Trust Control versus "No License"?—Well, what do you think of Liquor versus

No Liquor?

10. Versus Private Enterprise?-50 far, no doubt Trust Control has been preferable to private enterprise-the old "pubs"; but we do not know where it will stop. The Trust has plans to spend an enormous sum on a "luxury" hotel for tourists. They are still awaiting the permit to build a "tavern" in North Invercargill, in the midst of a residential area. Where will they stop?

11. Any other remarks?-The provisions of the Licensing Act are not applicable to the Invercargill Licensing

Trust.

THE GAMING COMMISSION'S REPORT

strange labyrinth traversed The during several months of last year in the search for something approaching the truth concerning the ways of gamblers and those who make a living by catering for their perverted needs, has yielded material for a report commendable for the promptitude of its appearance, for the thoroughness of its scope, and for the evident recognition of certain of the more flagrant and common breaches of the present Gaming Laws. The effort to formulate some plan for the regulation of this great national evil brings home to the social worker the terrible hold on the community exercised by horse racing and kindred "sports," in a way that startles and shocks. The calm acceptance of conditions fraught with danger to the whole national character and standing, is a feature causing deep concern. That betting is to be regarded "as a widespread," deeplyrooted and widely approbated propensity," beyond the power of the law to overcome, but capable of regulation in the public interest, seems to be a submission to entrenched evil. The statement regarding the recommendations on bookmakers' activities is worth consideration in this connection: "It would be a dangerous thing in any event to give any legal character to the activities of men or a body of men who for years have persisted in earning their livelihood in defiance of the law and at the risk of often threatened and sometimes imposed imprisonment. We condemn the suggestion that the State should surrender to the difficulty of suppressing illegal bookmaking and embark upon a policy of appeasement by licensing it." This is good advice. It could be equally applied to certain long-suffered illegalities practised in the liquor traffic. But we are told that these are the results of efforts to restrain and regulate the traffic. Well,

THE POLIOMYELITIS EPIDEMIC

This major calamity to Dominion-wide interests and plans for the summer, in addition to the heartbreaking sorrow and suffering experienced by its victims and their relatives, brings us face to face with a problem which seems little nearer its solution than in 1916, when the first visitation of the epidemic form of the disease was experienced here. Though a great deal of research has been carried out, the conquest of "Infantile" has not yet eventuated. We hope and pray for the speedy ending of the present epidemic. To those who have suffered in any measure, we offer our sincere sympathy.

MINISTER FOR HEALTH

We have reason to congratulate the Minister for Health, Miss Mabel Howard, on her forthright and sen-

sible handling of certain matters coming within her sphere of activity. Foremost among these is her work in connection with Mental Hospitals. By personal inventation, Miss Howard realised the need for some alterations in long-established custom, and without delay, saw to it that these were made. Her efforts to abolish the "stigma" attached to the idea of mental illness are worthy of everyone's gratitude. Women's organisations have plodded for years in the attempt to have the handling of foodstuffs carried out with the maximum of cleanliness and efficiency, and the thought that their efforts have some chance of effectiveness through one of their own sex in the position held by Miss Howard, is an additional cause for satisfaction that the Government was sufficiently enlightened and progressive to place a woman in charge of the Portfolio of Public Health.

HOLIDAY DRINKING

At a provincial seaside resort having a normal population of a little over a thousand inhabitants, it was stated in the local newspaper that in ten days of the holiday period £15,000 was spent in beer. "This would mean," the paper said, "that £1,500 was spent each of those ten days." 15,000 to 20,000 dozen bottles were to be collected as the result of the days of holiday. Comment is needless.

OTAGO CENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS

The whole Dominion is interested and sympathetic in the happy festival year of Otago. The story of the first foundation of the province is one to stir the blood of all readers. A solid structure of character and achievement has resulted from those early beginnings. The contribution to the religious and cultural life of New Zealand made by Otago, and especially of course by Dunedin, has been worthy of those great souls who in days long gone by, stood for freedom and the right to worship in their own community church; and whose sons were among those who began to build "Jerusalem" in this green and pleasant land. We join with all who send good wishes to Otago.

"BEERCOTT" PROFITABLE

Since the beer boycott—or the "beercott," as it is now known—was imposed on the West Coast, it has had six important results. Gardens now receive more attention; houses are being painted and repaired; absentee is at the mines has almost disappeared; earnings have increased; coal production has never been higher; and everyone agrees there is a better social and domestic atmosphere prevailing than there was before. These points are made in an official statement issued by the Grey Valley Miners' Central Committee.—(Nelson "Evening Mail," December 11th.)

CONVENTION REMITS, 1948

AUCKLAND

1.-That this Convention of the penalty should be attached to the holding of Convention bi-annually, railway trains.

2.—That this Convention views with alarm the pernicious sex literature being imported into our country; and desires the Government to prohibit this importation as it affects the social and moral well-being of the younger citizens of New Zealand.

SOUTH AUCKLAND

3.-That this Convention urge upon the authorities the necessity for ensuring that Cinema Programmes advertised as being suitable for children should not include ANY screening of unsuitable films.

MANAWATU

4.—That it be a recommendation to Sunday School Unions that a question on the Temperance lessons be included in the annual Scripture Examination papers.

5.-That Temperance Instruction, which is on the School syllabus should not be overlooked at the time of the Inspectors' visits to the schools, otherwise there might be a tendency for it to be omitted by teachers.

HAWKE'S BAY

6.-In view of the growing practice of hotel-keepers of supplying liquor to youths under age, this Convention urges that in the event of these youths being brought before the court, the law regarding those who supply the liquor be rigidly enforced.

7.-That the Minister of Broadcasting be asked to arrange for an authority on Alcohol to give short talks over the air in the Correspondence School

tice in general.

N.B.-That this additional cost should be laid at liquor's door is attested by authorities quoting alcoholism as being responsible for some 12 per cent of all first admissions to hospitals for the insane, and stating that alcoholism definitely predisposes the acoholic to infection generally. In this connection it is relevant to quote a statement by Sir George Paish, a celebrated British Economist, who, after World War I, said that the abo-lition of the drink trade would enable the trade of the world to be restored. When a world shortage of food exists and when world trade is anything but satisfactory, we would most strongly urge the curtailment of this enormous waste, occasioned by this traffic in drink, which, without any exaggeration, constitutes a reproach to any people.

HOME MAKERS CORNER

By "Lynette"

KEÉPING COOL Hot weather calls for as much ingenuity in meal planning as does cold weather, and there are certain types of food that definitely add to our comfort and well-being on hot days. In ordinary circumstances of health, the temperature of our bodies remains the same, winter and summer, and this even temperature is maintained mainly increased perspiration. evaporation of moisture keeps our skin cool, but our systems demand a larger intake of water to compensate for this loss. We naturally drink more, and we can also take in more water in our food by eating salads, fresh and stewed fruits, light soups, and the gelatine dishes which are so refreshing and varied.

As well as losing water by perspira-tion, we also lose salt, and in very hot climates it is not unknown for people to become seriously ill through lack of salt. During the war, troops in the islands were given salt tablets daily to counteract possible deficiency, and though we need not go as far as this, we should recognise that we may need more than we take in winter.

Hot dishes should not be excluded entirely from our tables, and it is as well to have one hot dish for most meals, but of course, these should be on the "light" side. If you are lucky enough to own a refrigerator there are many delightful ices that can be made, and gelatine recipes set so quickly that they can be left until the eleventh hour with no sad results. Iced soups are a refreshing change that only a refrigerator can give.

CUCUMBER JELLY

3 cucumbers, 4 cup cold water, 1 tablespoon vinegar, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, a little green colouring, 1 tablespoon gelatine, 1 cup boiling water, a few drops of onion juice, a pinch of

Peel the cucumbers and grate them into a bowl to get both pulp and juice. Put pulp through a strainer to get 12 cups of juice. Soften gelatine in cold water and dissolve in boiling water, and add all other ingredients. This may be set in a mould and served with salad round it, or it may be set in a shallow dish, cut into cubes and used as an ingredient in a salad.

MARSHMALLOW DESSERT

2 level tablespoons gelatine, 4 egg whites, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 cup cold water, 1 cup sugar, a few drops of cochineal.

Soften gelatine in a small saucepan with half cup of cold water. Then stir over gentle heat until dissolved. Add remaining half cup cold water and let cool. Beat the egg whites stiff and pour in gelatine very slowly, beating all the while. Add sugar and continue beating. Pour half the mixture into a bowl or mould, and sprinkle with chopped nuts and sultanas or chipped chocolate. Colour the remainder of the marshmallow pink and pour on to the white layer.

MINISTER FOR HEALTH

It was with considerable pleasure that the announcement of Miss Mabel Howard's appointment to the portfolio of Health was received among all women who look forward to the full recognition of the ability and fitness of their sex to occupy public positions so long held entirely by men. Apart from all party bias, there was a healthy satisfaction in the realisation that a woman was a suitable person for this particular field. Miss Howard has not been content merely to act in a conventional, traditional groove, and the wisdom of the appointment has been evidenced by many examples of initia-tive and individuality on her part. We especially congratulate Miss Howard on her attitude regarding Mental Hospitals. Her earnest endeavour to improve the general conditions for mentally sick peope, both in regard to their physical well-being while undergoing treatment in the mental hospital, and to the removing to some appreci-able extent, of the "stigma" so long allowed to increase the sorrow and distress of patients and their relatives, has commanded the respect and gratitude of many who may not see eye to eye with her in the field of open politics.

Womens organisations have sent forward remits for years asking that certain health precautions should be made unavailingly. Miss compulsory, Howard's forthright procedure regarding the wrapping of bread, though at the moment of going to press still somewhat resented by retailers, somewhat resented by retailers, brought to a head and disposed of a retailers, long dissatisfaction with the crude, unpleasant handling of our staple food. Other reforms may be expected. A

notable one would be the carrying out of a very often reiterated request that sugar should be enclosed in calico or paper before being put into the regulation "sugar bag." The amount of foreign matter contained in sugar placed in direct contact with the material of the bag can be easily assessed by the simple straining of sugar syrup through muslin. The result is something of a revelation. Of course, this particular problem has not worried us during the war and post-war years, but it will be interesting to see whether the strong womanly commonsense of our Minister of Health will not bring about the very necessary change.

Small things, perhaps, but in the aggregate, such things mean a great Miss Howard's ability has been revealed in other ways too numerous to mention here. We join very sincerely in thanking her for what she has done, and in wishing for her success in her undertakings on behalf of the people of New Zealand who seek as a magnum bonum a reputation for their country as a healthful, happy place to live in, worthy of its sunny,

delightful climate.
