In our happy anticipation of Mrs. Forrester-Paton's visit to New Zealand, one great factor is that in her we shall see the actual personification of the "tie that binds" so many women, of so many lands, in one united army, organised to make war upon the Root Evil of our time.

Each country in the World W.C.T.U. has its own problems, its own methods and its own organisation. In our land we have certain aspects to consider which do not enter into the working of the Union elsewhere. But, these differences are merely skin deep. At heart there is one glowing core of intense belief in the rightness of our cause—that of educating and agitating until we have secured "Total abstinence for the individual and Prohibition for the Nation."

FRANCHISE DAY September 19th WOMEN LEGISLATORS

Women are playing an important role in India today. There are at present 53 women members of Central and Provincial legislatures, the youngest being Mrs. Sudha Kumari Rai, 25, in the Central Provinces Assembly. Three of them are deputy speakers of Provincial Assemblies. As a result of the recent order opening all government services to women, a number of them are beginning to fill executive

posts; two are sheriffs and one is a magistrate in Delhi. There are three top positions held by women, namely Mrs. Vijayalakshmi Panditas, Ambassador to Moscow; Mrs. Sarajini Naidu, Governor of the United Provinces; and Rajkmuari Amrit Kaur, Health Minister of the Government of India. There are at present 5,000 women doctors, 7,000 women nurses and many thousand women teachers.
