Fifty-six years ago Southland had the distinction of introducing to New Zealand the Women's Christian Temperance Union movement, which since that time has become Dominion-wide.

On Wednesday afternoon, the 3rd October, a birthday party was held in the Tudor Lounge in celebration of the fifty-sixth year of the life of the organisation which has been instrumental in doing a great deal of good work.

Mrs. Walker, President of the District Union, received the guests.

Mrs. R. R. McGregor, President of the Central W.C.T.U., presided, and there was a large attendance of members and friends.

Mrs. Macgregor, in extending a welcome to those present, said that the Central Union was formed in 1884; and, being the first, was the mother union in the Dominion.

Miss Birss recalled that a considerable amount of opposition was encountered when the organisation was first mooted and there was difficulty in securing a Church building for a meeting place. Eventually the Rev. Mr. Dutton, Central Methodist Minister, kindly arranged for his Church to be used. It was decided that a message of greeting be sent to Mrs. Dutton, the only surviving member of the original organisation.

Messages of congratulation were received from Mrs. N. Peryman, Editor of the "White Ribbon," Mrs. J. Hiett, Dominion President, Miss C. Henderson, Christchurch, Miss Lovell Smith, and the Sydenham Branch.

In conveying greetings from the Council of Women, Mrs. Stanley Brown said she was proud to belong to a band of women who had carried on the work of those pioneers who had so nobly dared all for principle's sake, and it was for us to see that we did not ever let them down.

MY MAORI PEOPLE

Address at Wellington Central Union, by Mrs. H. D. Bennett.

Mrs. H. D. Bennett gave a most interesting account of her Maori people before the coming of the Pakeha, and of the evils and degradation following the introduction of the Waipiro (stinking water-Fire Water). She asked us to put out of our minds that the white man conquered the Maori. The true fact was that when the whalers and traders came with their waipiro, then troubles arose and the Maori chiefs sent to Queen Victoria and asked her to send men out to take charge of these traders and whalers. And when they came the great chief Whakanini, by his influence, secured the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi. She urged us all to read this Treaty.

Also it was a false idea to say the Maori was a heathen or a pagan. They had their own religion brought with them from their far-off northern home. They worshipped one Supreme Being, but held that different compartments of work were under minor deities, such as the god of wind, of sea, of the kumara patch. But all were under the control of the one God, Jehovah. The Maori had Eol worship. This is very interesting when we remember that Elohim was the Hebrew plural for God.

Mrs. Bennett spoke of visits paid to Parahaka (she belonged to that tribe) and Te Whiti was their chief. Often she visited her sister (the first wife of Bishop Bennett) before the liquor had made inroads among his people. She then contrasted it with a visit paid there to the Hui at the unveiling of the monument to Sir Maui Pomare, at Waitara. At that gathering Sir Aparina Ngata had said to her "Your people are great drinkers." When the elder folk left the gathering the young folk brought in much liquor and consumed it. Her own father was a strong teetotaller and yet she had to fight to keep liquor from his funeral tangi and after she had gone cousins had introduced liquor and the evening was spent in drinking. She had the demijohns of liquor emptied before she left, but they were filled after that. The law was not enforced and liquor was purchased after hours. She spoke of Te Whiti, who was a

wise man-a real prophet. At first he had the old Maori religion which, like Buddhism, was a religion of fear Then he came under the influence of Rev. R. Ward, one of the earliest Methodist Missionaries, and from him learnt the Christian religion of love. God was his father. Every year at a certain time all the tribe came from far and near bringing their own food and spent two or three days listening to the wisdom of the gospel of love taught by Te Whiti. Her own parents used to cross from Motueka to be present at this yearly gathering. Te Whiti told the English that he would keep the country from Mokau to Waitotara, but all the rest they could have. But surveyors were sent into Te Whiti's country, they ran their ploughs through the kumara patches and trouble followed. Te Whiti urged his people not to grab at the land. and had they followed his advice she thought a better feeling would have become genera' among them. She also spoke of the King Country, and the promise given to the Maori Chiefs that the Waipiro should never be sold there. How deeply it was to be regretted that the Christian nation had not kept that pact.

Mrs. Bennett spoke of the Maori lads who were enlisting to fight for the Empire and how the Y.W.C.A. had spoken of the splendid behaviour of these boys while in camp.

Mrs. Bennett closed upon a ringing note of trust and confidence that the evils of to-day would be overcome and Pakeha and Maori working together in God's great vineyard would build up a new and better race with "the best qualities of your people and of mine."
