We wish to remind our readers of the Conference to be held in Christchurch from the 11th to the 25th January, 1952. It is probable that delegates will be present from U.S.A. and Canada, Hawaii, India, Pakistan, Japan, Tahiti, the Philippines, Western Samoa, New Caledonia and Australia. The President and chairman, Miss Josephine Schain, lawyer and social worker of New York, has already left U.S.A. by freighter to visit Pacific countries en route to New Zealand.

The leader of the American delegation, Mrs. Henry C. Fowler, attended a UNESCO Conference at Florence last year and already this year has been to conferences in Greece and Turkey. Turkey she met women from the Arab States, Israel and Afghanistan, and after the Conference paid a visit to Israel, which she described as "a wonderful experiment in modern pioneering."

Papers are being prepared by specialists on the actual status of negro women in education, teaching, business and the professions generally. Christchurch Locality Committee has been busy arranging for the accommodation of delegates in lecture halls and rooms for forums and discussion

Any woman can join the P.P.W.A. as a private member for a subscription of five shillings per annum, and for this receives the minutes, notices, etc. Any woman can apply for a season tickt to the Conference for a subscription of one guinea. In reference to your letter of 27th April, concerning parcels of used magazines and papers addressed to Seamen's Rests at New Plymouth and Timaru, I have to inform you that single copies of newspapers addressed to the Manager, Librarian or other person having the charge of any New Zealand Free Reading Room, Sailors' Rest, or Charitable Institution, which has been authorised to receive newspapers free of postage, or addressed to Lightkeepers, are permitted to pass through the Post Office FREE. If directed to the care of an Officer or to a name at the Institution, they will be treated as ordinary newspapers.
