ENGLAND

"Base" to be Established at Trentham Camp

The Church of England is to have a building which will act as a base for the chaplain's work and will provide centres for reading, writing, recreation, entertainments, and the distribution of light refreshments. Similar work was undertaken in the last war, the Church, through its Military Affairs Committee, raising £50,000 for these activities. The Military Affairs Committee, with the assistance it is seeking from all Church of England people throughout New Zealand, is again undertaking this work.

Plans have been prepared for the 'base" at Trentham Camp by Messrs. Gray Young, Morton and Young. They provide for a wooden building of one fioor, having a malthoid-covered roof. The building will contain a hall, 54ft. by 34ft., divided by folding doors, to make a reading-room and a recreation room. By folding the doors back there will be one big hall for social or Church purposes. The hall will be equipped with two open brick fireplaces and a serving counter and storeroom. At one end will be the chancel, vestry, and officers' livingroom and bathroom, and at the other end a stage, with a dressing-room on each side.

The hall will have two entrances with porches, and lighted on both sides with dormer windows. The chancel will have a special finish and will be cut off from the rest of the room with curtains when it is not in

The building, without furniture, is to cost £1750. Similar buildings are to be established in the other camps. The fund being raised for the Church's work among the Forces is to be spent by the Church, as it comes within the exemptions allowed by the Patriotic Purposes Emergency Regulations.
