HOME DEFENCE

Organization Of Land
Forces

IMPORTANT CHANGES

Appointment Of Divisional
Commanders

TEMPORARY BRIGADIERS

Important administrative changes
in the home defence units of the
land forces of New Zealand were
announced yesterday by the Min-
ister of Defence, Mr. Jones. He
said that the army was being placed
on a footing, both in organization
and training, that would facilitate
a smooth and rapid change-over
should mobilization become neces-
sary.

"It will be obvious that an organiza-
tion suitable for peace conditions, with
a Territorial Force of 16,000, will not
answer the demands which would be
placed upon it should an army of over
40,000 be required to defend these
shores," Mr. Jones said. "The Govern-
ment has therefore decided that the
commanders of the more important
formations and their principal staff
officers should hold their appointments
in peace in order to enable them to
study the various tactical and adminis-
trative problems with which they
might be faced in war. This decision
will also enable these commanders to
undertake the training of their staffs,
a provision which is very necessary in
view of the number of highly trained
officers who have gone overseas with
the New Zealand Expeditionary Force.

Commanders of Divisions.

The following three officers have been
granted the temporary rank of brigadi-
er, and posted as follows:—



Colonel P. H. Bell, D.S.O., to com-
mand the first (northern) division,
with headquarters at Auckland.

from October 14, when the following
additional changes will also take
place:—



Colonel R. A. Row, D.S.O., to com-
mand the northern field force.

Colonel E. T. Rowllings to command
the southern field force.

Lieutenant-Colonel L. Potter, from
G.S.O., northern district, to command
the central field force with temporary
rank of colonel.

Lieutenant-Colonel A. E. Conway,
O.B.E., to be Adjutant-General, with
the temporary rank of colonel.

Lieutenant-Colonel L. G. Goss, to be
colonel, general staff, with the tempo-
rary rank of colonel.

Lieutenant-Colonel H. E. Avery,
C.M.G., D.S.O., to be quartermaster-
general with the temporary rank of
colonel.
