
The Selection "Rose Marie" is to be assisted with 50 voices and should add effectively to this grand selection.

WHAT GERMANS **ALLOW**

A list of the articles which the Ger man authorities permit to be included in parcels sent to prisoners of war in Germany has been received by the parents of Second-Lieutenant D. C. Bailey. Otahuhu, who advised them in a letter received last week that he is now in a German camp. The list also gives notes on how prisoners' relatives should conduct their corres pondence.

The information is contained in a typewritten sheet issued by the camp commandant and is headed: "Notes for P.O.W., for transmission to rela tives." The circular is for enclosure with letters sent by prisoners, and is dated June 24. Lieutenaut Bailey's etter was written on June 25.

The notes instruct relatives not to mention "forbidden subjects," to keer letters short, and not to put them in parcels. Parcels are permitted to con tain clothing and underwear distinctive from civilian clothing, foot-wear, food, and "similar things"; to bacco, cigarettes, cigars, pipe tobacco. toilet requisites (excepting bair lotion. mouth wash, tooth paste, and per fumes), games, cards and books.

Among the articles prohibited are torches, cigarette lighters, candles.
medicaments of any kind, vaseline.

SOLDIER SAFE

N.Z. Amateur Boxing Champion

Advice has been received by Senior-Sergeant A. G. McHugh, Hamilton, that his son, Lance-Corporal Maurice James McHugh, who was reported missing in Crete, has escaped from the enemy and is now safe in Egypt Senior Sergeant McHugh had been advised privately that his son had been frtally wounded and he had given up hope.

Lance-Corporal McHugh, who is 24 years of age, was educated at Sacred Heart College, Anckland, where he was open boxing champion for three years, and the Auckland University Col lege. He was employed by the Customs Department before entisting.

From 1936 to 1938 Lance Corporal McHugh was Auckland University and open amateur heavyweight champion in 1937 and 1938 New Zealand Uni versity champion, and in 1938 New Zea land open heavyweight boxing cham pion. He won the New Zealand troop championship in Egypt last year and again this year Last year he won the Australian and New Zealand heavy weight championship in Egypt.
