WARTIME CRICKET

N.Z.E.F. Draws With Aldershot Command

(From the Official War Correspondent attached to the New Zealand Forces in Great Britain).

Somewhere in Britain,

September 16.

Recent unexpected changes in the training and service programme of the N.Z.E.F. in the United Kingdom have interfered with games fixtures. Nobody complains of that; sport is only incidental to our presence in this country, and all hands would much rather get on with the real job than be kept hanging about playing cricket or tennis. None the less, it would have been a pleasure to have visited the Australians' camp for the return cricket match, now postponed and likely to be abandoned for this season, because of graver things to concern the two sides.

The New Zealand team for this match would have been slightly stronger, on paper, than that which beat Australia at the first meeting; also, it would have been more experienced. Many of our regular players hardly had a bat in their hands last season, and some of the team had not played regularly for several seasons. None the less, it gave a very heartening display against the Aldershot Command just before we left the base camp. The Command XI (in which normally Eric Tindill would have been keeping wickets) included two English internationals, B. H. Valentine and A. L. Gover, former captains of Yorkshire and Oxford University, A. B. Sellers and M. M. Walford; a Cambridge Blue, another Oxford Blue, and three other county players. Against such talent it was a noteworthy performance to play a creditable draw. Command declared at the tea interval with nine down for 248; at stumps New Zealand had lost six for 162. Gover's one wicket cost him 63 runs, and 53 were hit off Watts, of Surrey, for three wickets. On the other hand, S. H. Betts, Taranaki, took six for 59, including two with successive balls at the close of one over, the second being Watts, clean bowled.

Chaplain to Air Force

POSITION AT HOBSONVILLE.

Advice of his appointment as chaplain to the Air Force at Hobsonville has been received by the Rev. A. Russell Allerton, vicar of St. Thomas', Freeman's Bay.

Mr. Allerton served in the Great War, enlisting with the Artists' Rifles in England, and later receiving his commission with the King's Liverpool Regiment. He was awarded the Military Cross, and was wounded in March, 1918. After the war he went to Keble College, Oxford, and took his Master of Arts degree. He then took a course of training at Ely Theological College, and came to New Zealand in 1929. He was shortly afterwards appointed to St. Thomas'.

FUTURE OFFICERS

WORK AT ARMY SCHOOL

Last week officers and officer cadets attending the infantry course at the Army School of Instruction, Trentham, have spent several days in the field applying in practice some of the military knowledge gained from lectures and training manuals during the first half of their period at the school.

On one of the excursions from the camp the officer's platoon and the northern platoon spent the day in Whiteman's Valley. Carrying equipment, including light machine-guns, and mortars, the men walked over a track from the upper end of the Trentham ranges to an appointed rendezvous near the Whiteman's Valley School.

In the morning and afternoon the trainees organised and carried out attacks on "enemy" positions in accordance with tactical schemes prepared by the instructional staff, under whose eyes the manoeuvres were carried out. After the northern platoon had practised, in advance, while the officers' platoon observed them in action, the cadets were set a problem which required them to observe a piece of terrain containing supposed enemy posts, and then to tell the instructors how they would go about attacking it with infantry supported by machine-gun and mortar fire. After the cadets had made their reconnaissance of the area they were required in turn to detail their plans to an instructor, who awarded them marks accordingly.

At midday all ranks were served with a hot meal, which consisted of hot soup, hot saveloys or cold meat and potatoes, pickles, stewed pears, bread, butter, scones, fruit and tea.

Major A. H. L. Sugden, N.Z.S.C., Commandant of the Army School, watched the day's work. Operations were in charge of Captain H. M. Early, N.Z.S.C., tactical instructor.
