LATEST WAR NEWS

LONDON Mr Churchill declared that the British American exchange of destroyers and offence bases will enable the U S to take danger by the throat whilst it is still hundreds of miles away . He expressed confidence that the third Reich will pass away as swiftly -perhaps more swiftly-than did Napoleon's army .

BUCHAREST Iron Guardists fought a pitched battle for nearly an hour with Rumanian soldiers within a block of the Royal Palace thursday night .

ROME Damage was caused to Italian bases on the Dodecanese Islands by British air and naval bombardments.

CAIRO British planes carried out sustained raids all day Wednesday on all the principal Italian air dromes in Eastern Libya including Tobruk Eltamini Bomba and El Gazala.

WASHINGTON General George C Marshall U S Army Chief of Staff said that the U S A is considering a proposal to release several hundreds of its obsolete war tanks to Canada for use in training.

AIMIRALTY COMMUNIQUE A British submarine has rescued the captain and crew of a British merchant ship, who were being taken under guard to Germany for intermment. H M S Submarine "Truant" was on patrol off Cape Finisterre when a strange ship was sighted. The submarine came to the surface and closed to investigate, ordering the ship to heave to. The ship proved to be the 5,790 ton Norwegian vessel "Tropic Sea" which had been captured by an enemy raider some 10 days ago.

LATEST official reports gives enemy aircraft losses in today's attacks on Britain as 38 . R A F losses were 15 fighters but 7 of the pilots are safe .
